



CELEBRATING 65 YEARS!

The Festival Chorus has been lauded by Calgary Herald reviewer Kenneth Delong as one of Calgary's pre-eminent choral groups – "able to deliver the excitement and choral thrill that only a fine choir can."

The Chorus has been applauded for its professionalism, musicality and inventive programming. The 40 to 50 auditioned members of the Chorus perform an annual series of three concerts, presenting the staples of a five-century-old choral repertoireeverything from the larger oratorio works requiring massive, stirring sound, to that of more intimate a cappella chamber works and swinging jazz selections.

The Festival Chorus was founded by Gerald Bales, O.C. and John Searchfield during the 1958-1959 season to perform a Handel-Purcell Festival. It became a standing amateur, community chorus and was conducted by John Searchfield until 1979, Dr. Brian Trevor from 1979 to 1991, and Mel Kirby from 1991 to 2023.

The Festival Chorus built its reputation on annual performances of full-evening oratorios works such as J.S. Bach's Mass in B minor and St. John Passion; Handel's Israel in Egypt, Judas Maccabeus, and Solomon; Haydn's The Creation, Mozart's 'Great' Mass in C Minor, Brahms' A German Requiem and Mendelssohn's Elijah and St. Paul and, in the realm of 'early music', Monteverdi's Vespers of the Blessed Virgin 1610.



PAUL GRINDLAY Artistic Director and Conductor

Paul Grindlay has sung in choirs since he was nine years old. He has performed with ensembles like VoiceScapes, Luminous Voices, Phoenix Chamber Choir, Pro Coro Canada, Vancouver Chamber Choir, musica intima, Tafelmusik Chamber Choir and Carmel Bach Festival Chorale. He also sang in the 1990 National Youth Choir and the 1991 World Youth Choir. After completing a Bachelor of Science in zoology

and a Bachelor of Music in voice performance/opera, both from the University of British Columbia, Paul pursued a solo performance career in Austria, Japan, England, USA and Canada. He has recorded CDs for NAXOS, Marquis and Toccata Classics. Paul has directed the Calgary Boys' Choir, the Knox Presbyterian Church Choir, The Airdrie Community Choir and SuperSonic Men's Choir, and currently directs the choir at Christ Church Elbow Park and Calgary Renaissance Singers and Players. Paul also teaches privately, and is in great demand as a performer, coach, clinician and adjudicator. When not involved in musical activities, Paul is most likely to be found guiding fly-fishing trips on the Bow River, hiking or cross-country skiing with his wife, family and friends, cooking, swimming or writing poetry. Sometimes he sleeps.



OKSANA YAREMCHUK Chorus Accompanist

Oksana Yaremchuk is a Ukrainian pianist who graduated from the Kyiv Musical Academy and studied under Professor Vsevolod Vorobyov. She began her career playing with vocalists and instrumentalists when she was 14 years old and since that time it has been her passion. From 2009 to 2017 she worked on cruise lines where she enjoyed opportunities to travel around the world, playing concerts and shows

with international singers and musicians. In 2017 Oksana came back to Ukraine and started working as a pianist in the Kyiv Musical College, founded by Vitaliy Lysenko. She has played in numerous masterclasses, competitions and concerts, and was awarded the title of "Best Concertmaster" on numerous occasions. In 2021 she also began performing with the Kyiv Operetta House as a collaborative pianist, playing for choirs, singers, and with the main orchestra.

WELCOME!

This is an exciting evening for me... for all of us... so we are delighted you are here to join us tonight. Thank you for supporting our endeavours. We hope that you will enjoy the music we have prepared to share with you, and you will want to come to our other concerts.

For me, singing is all about bringing people together into harmonious collaboration. Humans are a social species, and we fare best in groups, teams, ensembles and communities. Our winter festivals are similarly centred on gathering to reconnect, share and celebrate together during the coldest, darkest time of the year, when we are most in need of company and good cheer.

Performing is exhilarating, an "adrenalin rush," and that is part of the reason why we love to do it, but sometimes it can be nerve-wracking if we feel unready or uncertain. Thankfully, singing is an act of generosity, of giving something to others. I like to think of a performance as a special gift that we have taken time to craft with abundant care and love, lovingly wrap in bows and tinsel, then present to our audience. And although nothing we make ourselves will ever be "perfect," for we are all, ourselves, works in progress, a homemade gift of music doesn't have to be perfect, if it is unique and sincere. I believe that beauty is enhanced by imperfection, diversity and individuality, for perfection is often hard to relate to, cold, sterile and lacking in personality.

Tonight's program was inspired by news about several prominent art galleries selling works by male artists to buy more paintings by women artists. There is huge and entrenched gender disparity in the art and music worlds, with most of the traditional canon being the work of "dead white guys." It's time to give women composers the credit they so richly deserve, and this concert shines the spotlight on amazing Canadian women, two of whom - Diane Loomer and Stephanie Martin - I am lucky enough to call mentors ("womentors?") and friends. My wife and I worked with the late Diane Loomer when we lived in Vancouver in the 90s, where she co-directed Elektra Women's Choir, and founded Chor Leoni Men's Choir. We worked with Stephanie Martin at Calvin Presbyterian Church in Toronto, and later also occasionally with Pax Christi Chorale and the choir of St. Mary Magdalene (Healy Willan's Church). Both are inspiring leaders and community builders who enriched many lives through their gifts of music. We hope you too will feel enriched and uplifted by our concert tonight.

TONIGHT'S GUEST ARTIST



TAYTE MITCHELL Tenor

Tenor and Stage Director, Tayte Mitchell was born and raised in small town Vulcan. Alberta, Canada. Most recently, Tayte sang with The Brott Opera Festival as Alfredo in La Traviata by Verdi, conducted

by Alain Trudel and directed by Anna Theodosakis. Tayte has successfully completed a two-year residency as a McPhee Artist with Calgary Opera. Highlighted operatic engagements while in residence with Calgary Opera include Bénédict in Béatrice et Bénédict by Berlioz, the cover for Macduff in Macbeth by Verdi, El Remendado in Carmen by Bizet, Gastone in La Traviata by Verdi, and cover for Camille de Rosillon in The Merry Widow by Lehár. Other role experience highlights include Sam in Suzannah by Floyd, Le Prince Charmant in Cendrillon by Massenet, and the title role in Britten's Albert Herring. Tayte has been both a Vocal Fellow at Marilyn Horne's Music Academy of the West and a Studio Artist with Wolf Trap Opera. Tayte looks forward to playing the role of Bob Wallace in the Nuova Vocal Arts christmas musical production of White Christmas this December 2023!

As a stage director, Tayte was awarded first place by the National Opera Association Opera Production Competition for his production of Poulenc's La Voix Humaine featuring soprano Juliana Zara with Oberlin Chamber Opera. Other directorial highlights include Suor Angelica with Rezonanz Opera Company (Mentor, Ohio) and Menotti's The Medium with Oberlin Opera Theater, and a fully staged production of Schubert's song cycle Die Schöne Müllerin, re-titled The Miller's Mind, with bass-baritone Dominic Veilleux and classical guitarist Darren Young at cSpace, Calgary. Tayte was also Assistant Director under Rachel Peake for Calgary Opera's 50th Anniversary finale production of Verdi's Macbeth. Tayte is the Artistic Director and co-founder, alongside conductor Maria Fuller, of Ammolite Opera, a new chamber opera company based in Calgary that produces operas by living composers. Tayte produced and directed Ammolite Opera's first production in October 2023, presenting the Canadian premiere of Rene Orth and Mark Campbell's *Empty the House*. Tayte earned his Bachelor of Music at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music i9n 2018, majoring in both Voice Performance and Opera Directing. His Master of Music degree in voice from the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music under William E. McGraw was greatly aided by consecutive Government of Alberta Arts Graduate Scholarships in 2019 and 2020.


